Information Opportunities

- Provide support to individual artists for career development projects
- The project must help the artist take their career forward



Purpose of the program

- Eligible applicants
 have lived in Durham,
 Orange, Chatham,
 Person or Granville
 Counties, NC, for at
 least one year before
 the application
 deadline.
- Are at least 18 years of age.
- Are not enrolled in a degree program in your art form.



Eligibility

- Strength of the artist's work and commitment of artist – 10 Points
- Feasibility of project 10 Points
- Impact on the artist's career, as they define it in their career goals – 10 Points

Criteria for review




- An Emerging Artist is simply moving from one point to another to build their career.
- The "emergence" can be about the business of art ("I need a plane ticket to get to my audition")
- Or the creation of art ("I need to rebuild my wood fired kiln")

What do you mean by "emerging"?


- Career is defined by long term commitment to mastering the skills of your art form and developing a voice.
- One path is not more convincing than another – you can be self-taught, have an MFA or learn from your grandmother.
- Making money with your art is not required to be considered a professional.

What do you mean by "career"?

The application is your chance to tell the reviewers who you are – as an artist and as a project manager.



Telling Your Story



- Your work sample
- your career goals
- your resume

help the reader understand you as an artist.

Your story as an artist

- Your project description
- timeline and
- budget

help the reader understand your ability to manage the project.



Your story as a project manager

 Make the effort to explain the impact of the project on your career – this is often a deal breaker if your application gets to the final round.



TIPS

- Submit a coherent body of work for your work sample. You can upload files or link to a recording.
- Your resume. . . or bio. . . or CV should explain how you learned your skill as an artist and what you have accomplished.
- Check the math in your budget. Include income and expense. Income should equal expense.
- You can include artist fees for yourself in the budget. The grant is taxable income.

MORE TIPS

- If you have a complicated project it will probably take more words to explain than a simple one.
- Provide enough information for the reader to understand what you are proposing, but don't drown them in detail.
- Get a friend to read your narrative and tell you what they understood – you are very close to your subject matter and may not express your self as clearly as you think.

Say enough but not too much



- Put yourself in the reviewer's place – how can you make it easy for them to understand your proposal?
- What will make them remember you?

Pretend you are the reviewer

We hope that completing this application will develop your skills to

- describe your work and your vision
- build a coherent budget
- curate work samples.

These skills will help you to write strong proposals for commissions, residencies, grants and jobs in the future.
