

With the combined \$2,000, I was able to go into the studio and record my first ever protest song, "Seeds", written in 2014 after the murder of Michael Brown in my native St. Louis. It was with that song, I found my voice as an advocate, an arts activist, someone not afraid to tell the truth." — Rissi Palmer

Organization Overview

The Durham Arts Council (DAC) is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit and leading local arts agency in North Carolina dedicated to supporting the arts in Durham and the entire Triangle Region in North Carolina and has served the community since 1954. We do this through:

- Serving the Public: Providing and supporting arts programs, classes, exhibits, festivals, arts integration programs in schools, and arts events for residents, students and visitors of all ages.
- Serving the Arts & Cultural Community: Providing facility space, grant support, employment, exhibition, sales and performance opportunities, training, advocacy and information services for artists and arts and cultural organizations.
- Leading Arts and Cultural Planning, Advocacy and Creative Placemaking: Providing arts and creative economy research, arts advocacy, and development of the SmART Initiative downtown arts corridor.

Accessibility



The DAC building has designated accessible parking in the Manning lot directly south of the building. Ramps to the north and south of the building with approved handrails and automatic door openers provide access to the two main exterior entrances to the DAC. Within the building an elevator provides access to each level. Wheelchair-accessible restrooms are located on each level of the building. Restrooms on the main and lower levels are equipped with automatic door openers. Service animals are welcome inside the DAC building but must remain on a leash or in a harness at all times.

Advanced Wheel Studio* (Ages 16 + up)

This is an un-instructed, weekly studio opportunity for Advanced Wheel students who have taken classes at the DAC Clay Studio previously. The studio is overseen by a moderator, but this is not a taught course. Students must be considered intermediate to advanced level, having mastered such skills as consistent centering, pulling numerous shapes and heights, creating lids and handles, and skilled glazing technique. Students must be able to work independently, following all Clay Studio procedures. Students do not currently need to be enrolled in another course to qualify for this studio but must have taken at least two wheelthrowing classes within the last year at the DAC Clay Studio. *Registration for this class opens in advance of other classes. Qualified students who have taken at least two (2) Wheel classes within the last year can register beginning 10am on Friday, November 17.

mastered such skills as pinch, coil, and slab techniques for various shapes and sizes, creating lids and handles, and skilled glazing technique. Students must be able to work independently, following all Clay Studio procedures. Students do not currently need to be enrolled in another course to qualify for this studio but must have taken at least two hand-building classes within the last year at the DAC Clay Studio.

*Registration for this class opens in advance of other classes. Qualified students who have taken at least two (2) Hand-Building classes within the last year can register beginning 10am on Friday, November 17.



Drawing and Painting

★ Drawing Backwards: Charcoal Reduction (Ages 16 + up)

Students will learn about balance and composition, creating depth and harnessing a nuanced value scale to create beautiful, moody drawings using only erasers. \$35 required supply fee to be paid to instructor at first class meeting. John DeKemper, Instructor

Figure Drawing (Ages 16 + up)

Increase your ability to draw the figure with supportive instruction and critique. Lessons will focus on developing observational skills, gesture and contour drawing techniques, shading, line and value, mark-making, proportion, anatomy, and composition. Students sketch from a live, nude model in short poses (a few seconds to a few minutes) and long poses (up to 30 minutes). Each class will include examples, demos, and group instruction, as well as guided practice and individual and group critique. For homework, students will study and copy sample drawings provided. Basic drawing skills are recommended for this course.

Open Figure (Ages 16 + up)

Open, uninstructed figure drawing provides a forum for the maintenance of artistic skills and for uninhibited experimentation essential to creative development. Students must pre-register and have several options to choose from, including the option to pre-register for specific dates, as space allows. Students under 18 must provide a signed permission letter from a parent or guardian.

Basic Drawing (Ages 16 + up)

Drawing is a way of seeing and communicating. Develop your own personal eye and language as you discover principles of observations, composition, shading and mark-making. Each session will focus on a specific strategy and will include demonstration, practice, and individual and group critique. Homework is encouraged. Please see DAC online catalog for supply list.

Weekend Workshop: Intuitive Painting (Ages 16 + up)

This workshop provides a nonjudgmental and playful space that encourages students to find their creative voice, have fun, and see what naturally unfolds on the canvas. The first half of the workshop is the "unlearning". We experiment, play, and sling paint how we might imagine a child would. Layer upon layer, we create a chaotic mess on our canvas. The second half of the workshop is simplifying the chaos to create a unified cohesive painting. This process helps with letting go of expectations, finding our inner child, and allowing our creativity and artistic style to unfold organically and authentically. No experience is necessary, and all skill levels are welcome. These workshops are perfect for complete novices apprehensive about picking up a paintbrush for the first time to experienced artists in need of working through a creative block, loosening up, or approaching their work with a different perspective. 

Confirmations: We do **NOT** send confirmations for these courses. Unless notified by the Education Office students who have registered should assume that their course will meet as scheduled


